A Word from Pastor Kris

A Lens of Grace

Please forgive the delay in this month's newsletter — that's on me. I'm still adjusting to preparing a monthly message in this format while also stepping into the rhythms of fall ministry, including preparations for Charge Conference and all the many moving pieces that come with it. But in a way, that delay has inspired this message, because it touches on something I think many of us struggle with: grace.

True grace — the kind that reflects God's heart — is difficult to practice. In a world of division and deeply entrenched opinions, we are constantly faced with choices about how we will treat one another. Will my opinion take priority over my compassion? Will our disagreement matter more than our shared humanity? Too often, the answer is yes. And that's precisely what makes God's grace so powerful — because it is so rare and so difficult for us to master on our own.

Paul reminds us in Ephesians 2:8-9, "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast." This grace, shared with the church in

Ephesus during a time of deep division between Jewish and Gentile Christians, was a radical message. Since we are living in a time of deep division, we can receive this message well, too. The selection was a reminder that God's grace is not a prize to be earned, but a gift to be received — and that it is available to all people, no matter how different they are from us. Therefore, our good works and how we extend the grace God grants us *IS NOT FOR* our salvation but *BECAUSE OF* salvation.

You may respond by asking, if grace is freely given and not earned, then does that mean our differences don't matter? On one level, yes — our divides cannot cancel God's grace. But the deeper truth is that grace is meant to transform us. Our faith in Christ should shape the way we see and treat one another. It should help us look beyond disagreement to see the humanity in each other. Grace is not meant to erase diversity, but to help us embrace and even celebrate it.

I'll be honest — I'm still learning this myself. When I see people being harmed, individually or systemically, I grieve. Sometimes I get angry. But even then, I am reminded that God's grace is available to all — even those I struggle to understand or forgive. And that means I have to keep learning how to extend grace, even when it's hard.

So I ask for your grace and forgiveness for my delay with this newsletter — not because I deserve it, and not because I want you to see things my way, but because I hope that, even when I fall short, you can still see me as someone capable of receiving God's grace. And I hope you can see each other that way, too.

Because this is bigger than me or you — it's about how we see the world. If we begin to look at one another through a lens of grace, and if we encourage others to do the same, we might find new ways to live together even in our differences. We will disagree. We will see things differently. But grace allows us to see the image of God in one another before we see the argument. It helps us demand that our systems, our institutions, and even our government reflect that same grace in how people are treated. It helps us look across the aisle — politically, socially, spiritually — and still see a beloved child of God.

Grace doesn't mean we stop working for justice or speaking truth. Grace won't erase our differences, but it can transform how we live with them. And that's the beginning of something powerful. It means we do so with eyes that first see God's image in the person across from us. And maybe, just maybe, that's the starting point for healing the divides that seem so deep.

Church Council Update on Apportionments

At our July Church Council meeting, members revisited a decision first made in 2024 regarding the payment of apportionments to the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Last year, the council voted to withhold payments out of concern for not knowing clearly how these funds were being used. During that time, the Finance Committee continued to honor our church budget by setting aside the money into a separate account. After a season of prayer and discernment, the council unanimously voted to release those reserved funds and send them to the conference as budgeted.

Currently, our church is contributing 50% of our apportionments due to financial limitations, and this plan will remain in place through 2025. All points will be revisited again in 2026 as part of the budgeting process.

It is important to remember that apportionments support *connectional ministries*—the work of the conference on behalf of all churches, reaching far beyond our own community. Just as our congregation serves God by serving people locally, the conference organizes and resources ministries regionally and globally to transform lives in the hope of Jesus Christ. By moving forward in trust and unity, our council affirms that we are part of something bigger than ourselves, relying on the faithful stewardship of our conference leadership and celebrating the opportunity to join in ministry together.

A Beautiful, Bountiful Time

Autumn in Lancaster County is a beautiful time for us and a bountiful time for wildlife, all created by God. Fall is colorful with green lawns and winter rye fields, lovely, roadside wildflowers, and striking autumn leavers on deciduous trees, shrubbery, certain vines crawling up trees and fences, and tall grasses and weeds in fields and along roadsides.

Stands of goldenrod and Jerusalem artichoke, with their striking, yellow flowers, various kinds of asters that have lovely white, pale-lavender or deep-purple blossoms and other species of appealing wildflowers with pretty blooms decorate certain farmland roadsides and abandoned fields. Goldenrod and aster flowers are abuzz with multitudes of honey bees, bumble bees, pearl crescent butterflies, yellow clearwing butterflies, a small variety of skipper butterflies and other insects that sip those blooms' nectar into mid-October, pollinating the lovely blossoms in the process. Pearl crescents are particularly numerous fluttering around aster flowers because their larvae eat the stems and leaves of aster plants.

In fall, red maple trees and staghorn sumac trees have red foliage by September. Sugar maples have orange leaves, while hickories and tulip trees have yellow ones. Those leaves, with sunlight shining through them, brighten many woods. Colored foliage is THEE most striking part of fall in northeastern North America. It offers much beauty, entertainment and inspiration to us humans. Reds, yellows and the other colors in foliage is visible to us when green chlorophyll dies and fades away because the trees shut off the leaves' water supply, allowing them to die and fall from the trees, as part of the trees' preparing for winter.

Tall foxtail grasses turn yellow in autumn, while equally high redroot, lamb's quarters and pokeweed, which are types of weeds, have red foliage that is especially attractive when low-slanting sunlight shines through them, brightening many fields. The grasses, redroot and lamb's quarters produce many tiny seeds that field mice and small, seed-eating birds ingest during fall and winter. Pokeweed is loaded with dark-purple, juicy berries that robins, starlings, cedar waxwings and other kinds of berry-eating birds consume in autumn and winter.

In autumn, using that colorful, invigorating season's abundance, several kinds of wildlife have different ways of preparing for winter. Wood chucks fatten on greens so they can sleep through winter down their underground burrows. It's entertaining to watch gray squirrels, eastern chipmunks and blue jays stash acorns, beech nuts and other types of nuts in tree hollows and soil in lawns and woodland floors for winter use when food is scarce. The blue feathers of the jays are especially striking among the reds and yellows of the tree foliage as those birds dart in and out of the nut-bearing trees. White-tailed deer and black bears fatten on acorns and beech nuts to help them get through winter.

Many kinds of birds and some species of insects migrate through Lancaster County on their way south to warmer areas for the winter. I have seen migrating hawks, eagles, geese, blue jays, crows, hummingbirds and other kinds of birds during the day. And I have witnessed the migrations of small, woodland birds, including thrushes, warblers and others at night by focusing a scope on the full moon that silhouettes the birds flying in front of it. Two side things I noticed while doing that is the moon moves rapidly across the scope and silhouetted birds sporting ears are really local bats.

I also have seen bald eagles, ospreys, broad-winged hawks, a peregrine falcon, two ravens, black vultures, tree swallows, ruby-throated hummingbirds, a few warblers, which are small, woodland birds, monarch butterflies and green darner dragonflies from our back deck in the past few years. Interestingly, tree swallows feed on flying insects as they migrate, while some of the south-bound hummers and monarchs stop to feed on nectar in neighborhood flowers.

Autumn is a lovely, exciting time of year, with much God-created beauty that we enjoy, and an abundance of God-created food that wildlife consumes in preparation for the coming hardships of winter.
