### A Word from Pastor Kris

Advent is the strangest kind of waiting—because even as we prepare for what is coming, we already know the story by heart. Yet every year, something about it feels new. Maybe that's because, in ministry, we rarely live in just one season at a time.

Over the past few weeks, I've been planning worship from January through Easter. I found myself outlining Ash Wednesday readings and Easter sermon notes... and then I laughed, because Christmas hasn't even happened yet. That moment reminded me of something I've learned over the years: in preaching and worship leadership, we are almost never fully present in the current season. We have to live several seasons ahead—and at the same time, we must remain deeply rooted right where we are.

And there is something beautiful about that. Something grounding. Even when details shift and circumstances surprise us, our purpose remains steady. We will still celebrate that Jesus came into the world as Messiah for all. We will still walk the road of Lent and face the cross with honesty and hope. The church calendar keeps us oriented, even when the world around us feels unpredictable. The story moves forward with purpose, anchoring us in God's steady presence.

For me, I am grounded not only by the calendar, but also by you—this community. When we gather, whether in joy or in heaviness, we gather with compassion and kindness. We seek to be light, not because the world is utterly dark, but because there is always room for more light. Our shared purpose, our shared transformation, and our shared journey with

Jesus keep us moving forward. The Holy Spirit has been with us all this time, and that same Spirit continues to send us out with confidence—lifting us up before anything has the chance to bring us down.

Scripture reminds us again and again—Old Testament through New Testament—that God's people have faced uncertainty, injustice, and grief, and yet they persevered because they were rooted together. Rooted in God's promises. Rooted in shared purpose, shared struggle, and shared hope. I don't believe God desires our grief, but I do think God meets us in it. And more than that, God can use us—even in the deepest moments—to bring hope and healing into the world.

That brings me back to the church calendar. We know what's coming. We plan for it faithfully. But we also hold those plans loosely. Because God may call us to rise to a new need, even as we bring our frankincense and myrrh. God may ask us to love in a new way, even while lament feels close at hand. We cannot be so committed to our plans that we miss the holy moments breaking in right in front of us.

So my encouragement for us this Advent is simple: Let this season draw you back in. Don't miss the moments. Let what is familiar feel new again. Open your heart to receive what God is doing, and then be ready to be sent out in surprising, Spirit-filled ways. Time marches on—not to leave us behind, but to give us each day as a fresh opportunity for the Lord's light to shine through us.

May this season bring you grounding, wonder, and holy interruption—and may God's light guide us into a new year filled with hope.





### **The Way** - (a name given to the earliest followers/disciples of Jesus ) - Rev. Kevin Readman



In January, we will return to a more traditional Bible Study as we look at the Book of James. Hope many of you will be able to join in this time of thought and exploration.




### Wide Awake - Melissa Readman and Sandy Schmid



In this updated edition, Strobel investigates the evidence behind Jesus' birth, affirming faith and addressing skeptics with fresh research and compelling historical insight.




### Monday Night Bible Study - Bruce Tucker




### Women's Book & Bible Study - Sandy Schmid

### **Decorative Cones and Berries**

Decorative cones on pine and spruce trees and colorful berries on trees, shrubbery and vines add much beauty to many suburban areas in Lancaster County during fall and winter. Those attractive cones and berries are miracles of God's creations, as everything in the universe is. And birds and mammals that ingest seeds in cones and consume berries are also created by God. Those kinds of wildlife add their beauties and intrigues to those of the cones and berries.

In summer, cones, that grow from female flowers, are green with tightly-shut scales. But late in summer, when their seeds are mature, the cones open their scales to release brown, winged seeds, many of which are dispersed by the wind.

Native white pines and Norway spruces from Eurasia are the majestic coniferous species most commonly planted on local lawns. White pines are characterized by long, soft needles in bundles of five and long, brown, slightly curved, sap-splattered cones. Norway spruces have long, handsome, beige cones, and needled limbs that sweep gracefully out, down and up at the tips. Both kinds of elegant conifers have many lovely cones hanging decoratively from their needled boughs through autumn and winter.

Mice, squirrels and a variety of little birds, including crossbills, pine siskins, American goldfinches, dark-eyed juncos and others, ingest the small seeds of coniferous trees. Crossbills, that nest in coniferous forests farther north, have crossed beak mandibles that pry open the scales of cones more so that their moist tongues can extract the seed under each scale.

Bright-orange berries on planted pyracantha bushes and alien, feral Asian bittersweet vines, and red berries on native American holly trees and winterberry bushes are attractive in fall and winter. In November, and through much of winter, innumerable orange berries on bittersweet vines cascade down from treetops. And scarlet berries of American hollies are highlighted beautifully by the hollies' thick, evergreen foliage.

A variety of rodents, and several species of berry-eating birds, including starlings, American robins, cedar waxwings and others, consume the striking berries of these plants, and many other kinds of berry-bearing plants. The birds add to the beauties of the berries, and the landscape their dining in. And the birds digest the pulp of the berries, but pass the seeds in their droppings, spreading each kind of berry-producing plant across the countryside, insuring future birds of a food supply.

The appealing cones and berries add beauties to winter landscapes, including in suburbs. And they feed a variety of wildlife species, which liven winter scenery, including on lawns right at home.
